

An explanation of the notation, etc used on the song sheets:

Marks used on the song sheets:

- A. A “ | ” mark between words or within a word means there is a slight delay before the next word or within the word. So, in the case of “Sweet Home Alabama”, the word “both | er” means that the word is sung as “both er” me.
- B. A “ || ” mark means there is a longer delay before the next word.
- C. A “ – ” mark means the words joined by the hyphen are sung closer together.
- D. A “ ... ” mark means that the word (or part of the word) is sung for longer.

An explanation of how the notes played on the guitar for the particular song to which they relate are shown:

- i. If the note is, say, “e8”, that means that the note played is the top e string, 8th fret.
- ii. If the note is, say, “D4”, that means that the note played is the D string, 4th fret.
- iii. If the note is, say, “E12”, that means that the note played is the bottom E string, 12th fret.

References to how to play the notes:

- a. “b/u” = bend up.
- b. “b/d” = bend down.
- c. “h/o” = hammer on.
- d. “p/o” = pull off.
- e. “ / ” or “s/u” = slide up.
- f. “s/d” = slide down.
- g. “ ↗ ” = a quarter bend up.

You don't have to rely on any of the above, they're just there if you find them useful – No pressure; you can use as much or as little of the notation, etc. as you choose.
